Approval of Agenda.

Mr. Burt moved and Mr. Hernandez seconded to approve the agenda for the September 28, 2022 Board of Trustees meeting as presented. *Motion carried.*

Accreditation Year 7 Visit. Dr. Graydon Stanley and Dr. Sara Egbert led the Board of Trustees through a presentation on the College's upcoming accreditation visit, including a brief overview

of the Year 6 and Year 7 reports, why accreditation is important, the Board's role in accreditation, and preparation for the visit.

Consent Agenda.

Mr. Hernandez moved and Mr. Burt seconded that the consent agenda items be approved or accepted, as appropriate:1) August 24, 2022 Board Meeting Minutes, 2) Personnel Update. *Motion carried.*

Introduction of 2022-23 SGA Leadership. Dr. Stanley introduced SGA's 2022-23 leadership team from both campuses.

Student Government Association Activity Report.

- Walla Walla Campus. Mr. Ricky Gonzalez, Walla Walla SGA President, reported on the following topics:
 - Fall Quarter Welcome 1st day of fall quarter
 - o Improving communication with students/staff/faculty utilizing Canvas platform
 - Voter Registration and Right to Vote events

Faculty Senate Update. Report cancelled due to illness.

President's Report. Dr. Hickox reported on the following topics:

- Fall Quarter Enrollment: Due to significant portions of missing data within the PeopleSoft reporting system, an accurate representation of enrollment is not available and will be unreliable for the foreseeable future. Anecdotally, enrollment is significantly stronger than it has been and there is a stronger presence on campus. SBCTC's official enrollment count occurs on the tenth day, which is September 30.
- Warrior Pledge: The pilot is working as intended. We have identified 41 recipients for the pilot, and have an additional list of potential applicants in hopes that we can increase that to 50. Work is ongoing to determine the average cost per award, currently awards range from \$400-\$2,000 per quarter for cost of attendance.
- Kudos: Deep appreciation goes out to Maisee Peralez, Director of Student Financial Support, and the Financial Aid staff as they continue to work diligently to award financial aid to our students amidst continued struggles associated with ctcLink and staffing.
- CCAMPIS Childcare Grant: WWCC was awarded \$512,000 (\$128,000/year for 5 years), which is the maximum grant award available. We are working on plan for implementation of the grant and have identified a local provider that we are partnering with.
- Participatory Governance: A meeting is scheduled with the Governance Council to discuss how the existing council can help create a steering committee for the new

governance structure, as well as a call out for volunteers to participate in the steering committee.

Enrollment Reports.

- 2021-22 Year-End Enrollment. Dr. Nick Velluzzi reviewed the 2021-22 Year-End Enrollment Report compared to the previous year-end, including:
 - State-supported enrollment up 3 FTE, ending at 1,699 FTE
 - Contract enrollment increased 7%, ending at 1,413 FTE
 - Self-support enrollment was up 17 FTE, ending at 54 FTE
 - Total enrollment reported 3,166 FTE, up 4% from the prior year
- Summer Quarter Enrollment.
 - All funds closed at 1,082 FTE, down 12.5% from the previous summer quarter
 - State-supported enrollment closed at 366 FTE, down 2.4%
 - Contract enrollment was down 18% at 694 FTE
 - Self-support enrollment closed at 22 FTE, up 16 FTE from the previous summer
- Preliminary Fall Quarter Enrollment. Dr. Velluzzi highlighted fall quarter enrollment, compared to the close of the previous fall quarter:
 - State-supported enrollment reporting 1,623 FTE, a decline of 3.2%
 - Contract enrollment is down 73% at 348 FTE, largely due to the timing of corrections education enrollment
 - Self-support enrollment reporting 44 FTE, down 15 FTE
 - Combined fund sources amount to 2,015 FTE, down 33%, largely due to the timing of enrollment in corrections education

Financial Update. Ms. Lori Peterson provided a 2021-22 year-end financial update, including:

- Final updated Operating Budget of \$33,580,957
- Revenue
- Expenditures by Category and Function
- Course Program Fees

First Read: Board Policy 1340 – Participatory Governance. Dr. Hickox presented a first read of the proposed Participatory Governance Board Policy. The policy will be presented to the Board at its regular October meeting for a second read and approval.

Emergency Succession Plan. Dr. Hickox shared his emergency succession plan with the Board, naming Dr. Jess Clark, Vice President of Instruction and Dr. Graydon Stanley, Vice President of Student Services.

Introduction of Vice President of Human Resources. Dr. Hickox introduced Brooke Marshall, new Vice President of Human Resources and member of the Executive Leadership Team.

Faculty Emeritus Request. Dr. Hickox requested that the Board of Trustees grant Emeritus Status for retired faculty member, Eric Schulz. The Board of Trustees thanked Mr. Schulz for his

service to students and to the College, and Mr. Burt acknowledged Mr. Schulz as being an excellent candidate to be the first faculty granted emeritus status.

Mr. Burt moved and Mr. Hernandez seconded to grant emeritus status to retired faculty member, Mr. Eric Schulz, with the attached Board Resolution made a part of these minutes. *Motion carried*.

Board Reports / Remarks. The following items were discussed:

- Transforming Lives Award Mr. Hernandez and Ms. Leer will review nomination applications for recommendation to the Board at the October meeting
- Presidential Evaluation Sub-Committee Ms. Leer and Mr. Hernandez agreed to participate

RE: Interim Fall Quarter Enrollment

This memo contains enrollment data reported thus far for Fall Quarter, 2022.

- State-supported enrollment for fall quarter is currently reporting 1,561 FTE, which is currently down 117 FTE (7%) from the **close** of fall 2021.
- Contract enrollment is reporting 933 FTE, down 345 FTE (27%) from the **close** of fall quarter 2021. The difference is largely due to the timing of corrections education enrollment and the flow of corrections enrollment in PeopleSoft.
- Fall quarter self-support enrollment is reporting 45 FTE, down 14 FTE from the **close** of fall 2021.
- Enrollment for combined fund sources amounts to 2,538 FTE, down 476 FTE or 16% from the close of fall quarter 2021.

WALLA WALLA COMMUNITY COLLEGE PARTICIPATORY GOVERNANCE BOARD POLICY 1340

The State of Washington grants authority to govern Walla Walla Community College (WWCC) to the WWCC Board of Trustees. The WWCC Board of Trustees in turn delegates to the college President the authority to conduct college operations in fulfillment of the College's mission. While final operations decision authority resides with the President, the Board of Trustees hereby directs the President to establish and maintain a participatory governance system through which college administrators will collaborate with a diverse set of stakeholders in conducting the business of WWCC. The President is authorized and directed by the Board to develop college administrative policies and procedures and to take action necessary to implement and operationalize this participatory governance board policy.

The WWCC participatory governance system is required to conform to Standard 2.A.1 of the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU), which requires:

- 1) a broad understanding of the governance system by the college community;
- 2) clearly defined authority, roles, and responsibility; and,
- 3) consideration of the views of faculty, staff, administrators, and students in decisionmaking processes on matters in which they have a direct and reasonable interest.

The WWCC participatory governance system will comprise a cohesive set of councils, committees, and task-forces with identified purposes/work-products, levels of authority, clear lines of communication, reporting relationships to other groups or administrators, and workflow guidelines. Collectively, this network is responsible for identifying, analyzing, developing, communicating, recommending action, referring issues to others, and otherwise addressing opportunities and challenges associated with WWCC mission fulfillment.

The governance structure at WWCC shall be guided by the following general principles:

- The ultimate measure of effective governance is student success.
- All decision-making at WWCC is based on a shared understanding of the mission, vision, and values of the college, and ties as directly as possible to the WWCC Strategic Plan.
- Recommendations and/or decisions are made at the appropriate level of the organization, by the appropriate individual(s) or group(s), with the requisite expertise.
- Councils, committees, task-forces, etc. will exercise authority appropriate for the role of the group—recommendation (most common); decision (in particular circumstances); or advise-and-consent.
- Whenever practicable, employees and students should select their representatives.
- Representatives of constituent groups involved in the participatory governance process are responsible for keeping their respective constituencies informed of the proceedings and recommendations of the various governance groups, as well as for the general dissemination of information, as appropriate.

• Members of the college community who are not part of the participatory governance system have the opportunity to provide feedback to their designated representatives and to seek insight from other decision-makers or authorities.

The WWCC participatory governance system is predicated upon the recognition of the role and authority of the President as being directly accountable and responsible to the Board of Trustees for the educational leadership and effective management of the college's employees, facilities, land, and fiscal resources. As such, robust engagement in the participatory governance system is actively encouraged so that final decisions made by the President, or the President's designee, will be informed by the diverse input and multiple perspectives that constitute one of WWCC's greatest strengths.
